ICPE DAY RALLY - FEBRUARY 19, 2024

And when we talk about respect for educators, we're really talking about respect for the future.

In recent times, efforts to erode trust between educators and communities have emerged, masquerading as transparency initiatives. These efforts, while claiming to protect students, threaten educational freedom and professional judgment vital to our schools' success.

Despite these challenges, our commitment to a safe, inclusive, and enriching learning environment for all students remains unwavering. Our unity and collective action stand as our most potent assets.

As the vice president of ISTA, I assure you, we hear our members and the wider community. We're advocating tirelessly for these priorities at every level, committed to the cause and inviting each of you to join us in this effort.
